EIS in summary



- Interreg Europe project funded by ERDF under 2nd Call
- Budget 1.67m EUR (total ERDF = 1.4m EUR = 85% of grant)
- Duration: 4 years (1 January 2017 31 December 2020)
- Priority: SME Competitiveness
- 7 EU regions, 9 partners in total led by Hampshire County Council
- Knowledge exchange during phase 1 leading to implementation via local stakeholder groups of 7 Action Plans in phase 2
- Dissemination via social media (twitter, LinkedIn)
- All EIS results freely available

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Main barriers to SME internationalisation

Main barriers SMEs face in their internationalisation activities as documented in an OECD report in 2009:

- Shortage of working capital to finance exports
- Limitied information to analyse market
- Inability to contact potential international customers
- Lack og managerial time/resources
- ❖ Lack of technology skills/knowledge
- High price of their own product/service
- High operational costs of internationalisation
- Legislation

What?

How?

- Elaboration of a 6 step EIS model to support development of an EIS tool supporting decision-making of SME internationalisation
- Peer review of each EIS region
- Capture 21 Good Practices (3 per region)
- Development & implementation of 7 Action
 Plans



Main stakeholders



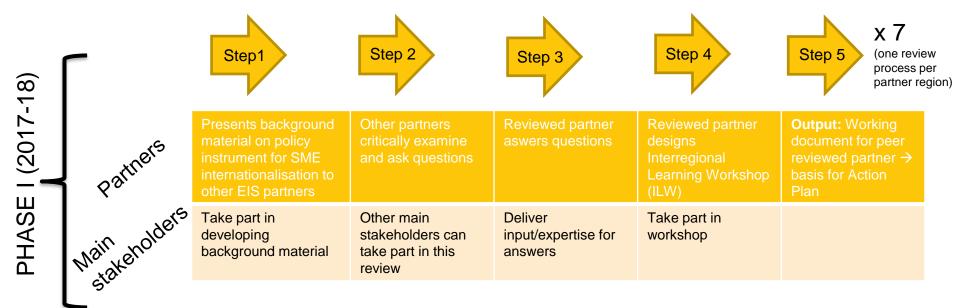
- Each partner region has identified a group of main stakeholders
- These groups consist of actors (e.g. chambers of commerce, trade associations etc.) who are part of the regional business support for internationalisation of SMEs in the respective regions
- By engaging the stakeholders from the project's start, the implementation of the measures coming from the Action Plans, will be more successful and thus have a larger impact

Situation

- Clearly define the current situation of your company
- · conducting a SWOT analysis of your enterprise

What?

- Product/service line
- Decide on the product or service you wish to integrate in this process

Where?

- · Select the right market to penetrate
- Screening potential markets
- Market analysis

How?

- · Mode of Entry:
- . (1) Exporting (2) licensing (3) joint ventures (4) direct investment

When?

- Point of Entrance
- . Find the right moment to do it: time channels resources
