Updated Tenant Handbook


The Tenant Handbook has been updated and a new version is available on our website at www.brighton-hove.gov.uk/tenant-handbook.

The handbook contains lots of useful information about your tenancy and explains your rights and responsibilities, as well as the council's responsibilities as your landlord. It also provides a handy reference guide, with useful contact information for all the services that we provide, so you know who to get in touch with if you have any questions or concerns.

The updated version covers changes that have happened

since the handbook was last reviewed in 2013. This includes legislation such as the Localism Act, which resulted in changes to succession and discretionary succession rights about who takes over a tenancy when a tenant dies.

We are encouraging tenants to use the online version of the handbook, which can be quickly updated with the latest information if there are any more changes.

Get more for your move

Is your home bigger than you need, or getting too hard to manage? If you do an exchange or transfer, you can apply for a one-off payment of £1,000 or more if you move to a smaller home.

Moving can help you avoid underoccupation charges and frees up bigger homes for larger families who need them. And think of the money you could save each year from cheaper rent, cheaper fuel bills, and possibly cheaper Council Tax.

You can apply for a transfer through Homemove, or why not try and find another tenant to do a mutual exchange with? The money in the pot for this transfer incentive scheme is limited, so don't delay.

Julie (not her real name) exchanged from a three bedroom house to a two bedroom in 2016. Because of the move the 'bedroom tax' no longer applied, and she received £1,500 into her bank account after moving.

Julie said: "The money was a great help, it paid for carpets, flooring, two sofas and some curtains. I would recommend the scheme 100% to any tenant looking to downsize."

As well as money for moving, we've got information about redirecting your post, getting a better deal from your energy provider, and even recycling furniture you might not need when you move.

If you have arrears or charges against your tenancy, these will be deducted from any money you are entitled to under the scheme.



We're running another amnesty for tenancy fraud between 3 April and 31 May.

It's illegal to sublet council or housing association accommodation or keep your social housing tenancy when you are living elsewhere.

During the amnesty, hand your keys back to us and no action will be taken against you for tenancy fraud.

You can hand them in at Bartholomew House, Portslade Town Hall, the Whitehawk Community Hub or the Lavender Street office.

Tenancy fraud keeps homes away from the people who need them more. National figures suggest that it costs the public purse £18,000 a year for each property, in terms of accommodating a family in temporary housing.

Six families were rehomed through the amnesty we ran last winter. The six homes returned included two three-bedroom and two two-bedroom properties.

New Homes for Neighbourhoods Update

Work starts on new city centre homes

Work started last month on 12 new council homes in Kensington Street, in the heart of the North Laine area.

This is the twelfth New Homes for Neighbourhoods (NHFN) new build scheme and will be made up of three houses and nine flats, including a flat of specially designed for wheelchair users.

They will be completed next year and let through Homemove to households in housing need at affordable rents.

Kensington Street has been popular with street artists and photos have been taken to provide a permanent record of the graffiti art on the site. These will be kept at The Keep archives and historical resources centre. The Keep is at Woollards Way, Brighton, BN1 9BP and is on the number 23, 25, 28, and 5B (peak times only), bus routes. Improving Homemove

We're replacing the
Homemove computer system
which manages choice
based lettings for council
and housing association
properties in the city. The
change to the new system is
planned for the end of May.

The switch will include a new Homemove website to make bidding for available properties quicker and simpler. If you're a current member of Homemove, you don't have to do anything – your Homemove number will allow you to access and make bids on the new website as you do now. Full guidance covering the changes will be available on the website.

Homemove allows tenants and prospective tenants to bid for the available properties they are interested in.

All available properties are advertised on the Homemove website. To bid, you must become a member of the Homemove scheme by applying to the council for housing or a transfer if you are a current tenant.

Home sweet home for Val and Carly

Mum and daughter Val Roche and Carly Macdonald are the first tenants to move into Kite Place in Whitehawk, the largest council new build scheme in the city for many years.

Val, who moved from Hove, said: "The flat is absolutely perfect for us, I love the open plan kitchen and living room and we have a lovely balcony. A lot of thought has gone into everything, even the corridors and landscaping of the grounds are amazing.

"I have two other children living in Whitehawk, so I am much nearer to them now. I can see my daughter's house from here!"

Kite Place is made up of 57 flats, built to 'accessible and adaptable' standards, with lifts to all floors.

Tenants also benefit from economical and efficient heating and hot water from communal boilers.

Also in Whitehawk, 29 new flats are being let at Hobby Place. The homes are a mix of one, two and three bedroom flats, located close to Whitehawk Academy.

A total of 165 new council homes for rent have been built under the council's New Homes for Neighbourhoods programme since 2015.

This includes 131 new homes completed in 2017/18 alone, and more are in the pipeline.

Amazing new homes for people living with dementia

People moving into the council's, cutting edge Brooke Mead Extra Care scheme in Albion Street, Brighton are settling into their new homes.

The scheme (pictured) is designed to help people with dementia carry on living independently, with self-contained flats and carers on site 24 hours a day, providing peace of mind for residents and their families. Residents have use of a lounge and social activity rooms, a laundry, courtyard garden and community café.

Fly tipping - the cost to everyone

Every year the council spends thousands of pounds clearing items that have been flytipped on our estates.

That's money which could be much better spent on improving homes and neighbourhoods.

During 2017 we cleared a staggering 4,130 flytipped items from communal areas and bin stores, ranging from a car engine and parrot cage to sofas and mattresses.

Removal and disposal of these dumped items cost the council more than £80,000.

It's not just the financial cost which is a concern. Keeping hallways, communal areas and fire exits clear of fly-tipped items is vital for safety reasons.

And rubbish dumped around communal bins can make them difficult to access and empty.

Everyone can help to keep our estates tidy for all to enjoy and we are grateful to residents who already dispose of their unwanted items responsibly.

Penalties for fly-tipping

Communal areas and bin areas across the city are regularly fly-tipped by people leaving furniture or other bulky items alongside bins. This is an

offence and can result in a penalty fine of £300.

Recycling centres

There are recycling centres in Hove (off Old Shoreham Road) and Brighton (Wilson Avenue). If you don't drive, do you have a friend or neighbour who does and can help you dispose of your unwanted items properly? For more information visit the website www. brighton-hove.gov.uk/recyclingcentres.

There are many ways to dispose of unwanted household goods, electrical items and furniture

Cardboard

Boxes and pieces of card can be easily recycled in your own recycling bin or at one of the recycling points across the city.

Bulk removal service

Cityclean have a bulk removal service which offers discounts to people over 60 and those who are on certain benefits. Call 01273 608142 to arrange a collection.

Furniture recycling

The Estates Services team runs a recycling project and can collect unwanted household items in good

condition. These are used to help people in need, for example, to provide furniture for residents whose property has been damaged by a flood or fire.

White goods such as fridges are in high demand, but unfortunately cookers can't be recycled at present.

Charities

Many charities also welcome donations of furniture and will often collect.

Residents in action!

When neighbours in Ingram Crescent, Hove, want to get together they head to their own log cabin.

The cabin is the bright idea of residents who form the local association, who were fed up with social events being washed out by the British weather! It was put up as part of a makeover of the estate's communal garden, led by resident Zoe Sheppard. John Saward, from the association, said: "It's absolutely fantastic, the cabin has become a focal point and it really helps to bring people together." The cabin is one of many imaginative and practical ways resident groups are building community spirit.

At **St James' House** and **Essex Place** in Kemp Town tenants have turned community spaces in their high rise blocks into thriving social areas. Volunteers at St James' House turned the community room into a café, which opens six days a week. All money raised is used to benefit residents.

Chris Row, secretary of St James' House Community Association, said: "Money raised so far has allowed us to improve the community room and organise parties and celebrations for residents."

Essex Place Friendship Club has a packed social calendar, including weekly bingo sessions and a kid's club three times a week. Tracie Murray, who organises the club, said: "If the lights are on, and we're in, you're invited to come and join us for a chat, get to meet other tenants, have a coffee."

In **Wickhurst Rise, Portslade** a new gardening group is taking root, and on the **Bates Estate, Brighton**, residents have converted a disused shed into a secure cycle store.

Digging in at Craven Vale!

Residents in Craven Vale in Brighton are looking forward to picking their own fruit.

Craven Vale Community Association and Brighton Permaculture Trust planted eight plum trees earlier this year. In recent years they have planted 74 trees in a variety of different species.

Money from the Estate Development Budget was used to pay for the trees and a new footpath. Resident Justine Hall, who helped to plant the trees, said: "I'm looking forward to seeing the fruits of our labours!"

The association organises a range of activities, including a popular weekly breakfast club run by volunteers. (See below right)

Alan Cooke, secretary of the association, said: "The whole point of the association is to create community and we have lots of events for residents. There's yoga, Thursday coffee mornings, and the breakfast club every Wednesday."



Is there something you'd like changed or improved on your road or estate, or in your block? Have you got an idea that will benefit your community?

If so, your project could receive money from the council's Estate Development Budget (EDB).

Last year 90 projects benefited, including a cycle store, improvements to communal gardens and new furnishings for communal lounges.

In 2018/19 around £350,000 will be spent on community projects. Applications can be made for projects in 2019/20 between June and November this year, with funds going to projects voted on by panels of residents next April.

You can apply for a 'quick bid' for funding smaller community projects costing up to £750 at any time of the year.

Launderette update

New replacement washing and drying machines have been installed in launderettes at 14 blocks of flats.

The machines are operated with tokens, available from Hove, Whitehawk, Moulsecoomb and Jubilee libraries. As part of their service to local communities, local shops near all launderettes (except Napier House which is currently under negotiation) are now also selling tokens. We are making arrangements with more local shops and businesses, and will keep residents informed of where tokens are available through tenant and resident associations and notices in the laundry rooms.

We appreciate the switchover to new machines has caused disruption for some residents and apologise for any inconvenience.

Changes were needed following the end of the previous contract for operating the launderettes,

and an operator could not be found to continue running the facilities.

To make sure we can keep the launderettes open, the council is now leasing washing and drying machines. A switch to payment tokens was prompted by residents' concerns that cash-operated machines could be a target for vandals. In some blocks the number of washing machines has been reduced to keep costs down. We will review use of the machines and increase the numbers, if there's enough demand to cover the cost.

The launderettes are at Dudeney Lodge, Essex Place, Hampshire Court, Kestrel Court, Mayflower Square, Napier House, Nettleton Court, Orchid View, Philip Court, Robert Lodge, St James House, Theobald House, Tyson Place and Wiltshire House This doesn't affect laundry facilities at seniors housing schemes.

How we've been doing

October to December 2017

Here are the highlights of our performance over the last quarter...



Tenancy management

We've helped 31 people to keep their tenancies which were at risk, and taken back two properties due to housing fraud.



Rent collection and current arrears

We've collected 98.79% of rent and this is down slightly on the previous quarter. Arrears have increased by £100,000 in the past three months, and anyone facing difficulties can contact us for help.



Estates service

100% of inspected cleaning tasks and mobile warden jobs passed their quality inspections.



Repairs and improvements

We completed an average of 165 repairs per working day, kept 97% of appointments made, and answered 75% of calls within 20 seconds.



Moving home

We re-let 131 homes in an average of 19 days (excluding major work), and completed 100% of mutual exchange applications within target.



Customer services and complaints

Housing Customer Service Team answered 97% of calls, and 82% of complaints were responded to within 10 working days.



Anti-social behaviour

We successfully concluded 72 cases, and 81% of people surveyed were satisfied with the way their antisocial behaviour complaint was dealt with.

New windows for hundreds of homes

Windows are being replaced at hundreds of homes across the city.

New windows were fitted last year at 172 homes in Bexhill Road, Woodingdean, as part of an ongoing window replacement project. The work was brought forward following concerns raised by residents about the condition of the existing frames.

Homes in Florence Avenue and Hallyburton Road in Hove and Wiston Road, Whitehawk, have also had new windows fitted.

Work is underway this spring at 100 properties in Cowley Drive, Ravenswood Drive and Stanstead Crescent, Woodingdean and more will be carried out in Hove and Portslade this year.

Feedback about work carried out has been positive, and the council's Property & Investment team and Mears would like to thank residents for their patience and help.

Did you know you can book doctor's appointments and order repeat prescriptions online?

Digital Brighton & Hove have recently run a successful pilot in some local GP surgeries, with the aim of increasing awareness and uptake of online services.

Out of 250 patients surveyed, only 14% were already using online services and about 50% were unaware that they could get repeat prescriptions online.

An impressive 84% were interested in signing up to GP surgery online services, after being shown how easy it was to use.

Why sign up to the free GP online services?

- Book or cancel appointments with a GP
- Order repeat prescriptions
- View your GP record, including information about medication, allergies, vaccinations, previous illnesses and test results
- And much more

How can I start using GP online services?

Simply take photo ID and proof or address to your doctor's surgery and fill in a short registration form which you will be given.
