Humanitarian aid and Civil protection

- The European Union provides assistance to countries and populations, both within Europe and abroad, when major disasters or humanitarian emergencies occur.
- EU action is in line with the four principles grounded in International Humanitarian Law (humanity, neutrality, impartiality, independence + solidarity).
- In humanitarian aid, DG shares competence with Member States and together they are one of the **leading global humanitarian donors**. When it comes to civil protection, the EU assumes a **supporting role**, coordinating voluntary contributions of IKA from countries participating in the EUCPM.

Timescale?	Immediate aftermath of crisis and beyond Depending on humanitarian needs	Acute stage only Normally first few weeks after a disaster European Commiss


Why we act?

• "To provide...assistance and relief and protection for people in third countries... victims of natural or man-made disasters" *Treaty of the Functioning of the European Union – Article 214*

• "...encourage cooperation between Member States for preventing and protecting against natural or man-made disasters" *Treaty of the Functioning of the European Union – Article 196*

EU Civil Protection Mechanism

When the scale of an emergency overwhelms national response capacities, the **EU Civil Protection Mechanism** enables a coordinated assistance from the Participating States.





Participating countries include

EU Member States



Iceland, Norway, Serbia, North Macedonia, Montenegro, and Turkey

Why is this important?

- One point of contact for disaster-stricken countries.
- Avoids duplication of relief efforts.
- Coordinates disaster preparedness and prevention.

Since its inception in 2001, the

EU Civil Protection Mechanism

has responded to

over 500 requests

for assistance inside and outside the EU.



UCPM: Three dimensions

- 1. Prevention: Support Member and Participating States in preventing risks or reducing harm to people, the environment or property resulting from emergencies.
- 2. Preparedness: Training, exercises, exchanges of experts, modules.
- 3. Response: Facilitate cooperation and coordination in responding to disasters inside and outside the EU.



How does the EUCPM work?

Natural or man-made disaster inside or outside the EU



Affected country requests assistance from the Mechanism through the **Emergency Response Coordination Centre (ERCC)**



Once the affected country has accepted the offers...

Member States and Participating States offer assistance, such as personnel and equipment



EU Civil Protection Mechanism activated



ERCC coordinates the deployment and delivery of assistance

ERCC may deploy a team of EU Civil Protection experts



Assistance delivered, experts return.



Monitors disasters around the globe

Maps disaster risks

Provides real-time information

Coordinates joint European response operations



Why it is important?

- The centre operates 24/7
- ERCC liaises directly with the national civil protection authorities of the country in need.
- The centre manages a reserve of pre-committed assistance from EU MS/PS that can be immediately deployed (the Pool).
- ERCC provides emergency communications and monitoring tools through the Common Emergency Communication and Information System (CECIS).



How does ERCC build its situational awareness?


- Early Warning Systems (e.g. GDACS, EFAS, EFFIS)
- Scientific advice (e.g. ARISTOTLE, JRC)
- Copernicus Emergency Management Service (satellite maps)
- External reports (UN Agencies, Regional Agencies, National authorities)
- Situation Awareness Team products
- Media
- ECHO Offices and EU Delegations
- EU Civil Protection Teams

FACTS & FIGURES

- ECPP is a reserve of resources committed by European states to respond to disasters inside and outside the EU.
- The Pool was established in 2013. Resources can be experts, equipment and transportation services. To date, 25 European countries contribute to the Pool.
- The Pool allows for a more predictable, pre-planned and quality-checked European response.



DG ECHO A3 Situational Awareness Sector 15/06/2021 rescEU medical stockpile for COVID-19 related items - situation overview







Maritime Pollution

- EU is a Contracting Party to Regional (international) Agreements: HELCOM, Bonn, Lisbon and Barcelona Conventiion (Rempec) contractual obligations
- UCPM/ ECHO supported by EMSA represents EU in working groups related to preparedness and response
- UCPM support to EMSa and EU MS for preparedness (projects, training, exercises), expertise, transport support
- EMSA- technical support, oil spill response (vessels, equipment, dispersants), satellite imagery Clean Sea Net.



MS X-Press Pearl Incident – Sri Lanka





MS X-Press Pearl Incident – Sri Lanka (2)

- On 20 May 2021, the "MV X-press Pearl" caught fire off the coast of Sri Lanka. On 2 June, the ship finally sank.
- On 4 June, the UCPM was activated based on requests for assistance from Sri Lanka and UN OCHA.
- Two environmental experts were deployed to Colombo between 15 and 30 June to join the OCHA/ JEU team.
- EMSA provided satellite imagery
- Norway provided advise on plastic pellets pollution management
- EC supported Sri Lanka Red Cross with EUR 200,000 humanitarian funding.
