


Rung 7: Young people led and initiated

In Turku

- In Turku three main elements: communication, cooperation and interaction between citizens, city officials and decision-makers.
- The key is appreciating the knowledge and experience of the citizen side-by-side with the expertise of the city officials. City is a partner and provider of possibilities
- Coordination "unit" of participation in the Central administration: general coordinator, neighbourhood participation, accesibility ombudsman, volunteer work.
- Each department supports and promotes participation, eg. there is interaction designer in the museum services



Influence Groups

- The six influence Groups are important actors of participation in Turku.
- One of the roles is to act as experience experts of the group they represent. They have a massive amount of voluntary organizations at their background.
- In practice, the Influential Groups make initiatives, give statements, organize seminars and follow-up decision-making. Their role is important in providing information of the current and future needs and concerns of their target group.
- The "semi-formal" role includes that some members of the groups are invited to participate in the Political Boards of the city, e.g. the Board of Culture.
- City provides them a small amount of funding for the activities and by providing a person for preparation and maintain the work





Parliament of Children & Council of Youth

- Meetings at City Council meeting hall, a 2-year term for both, elections
- Learning the important skills for meetings, debate, listening to others, advocate their own cases
- A good sense of taking in consideration their fellows and a wider responsibility of the society
 - establish in each school a box for "silent voices" to empower the quiet pupils
 - the money allocated to the meeting fees will be used to organise more activities to all organising events and raising money to support the Baltic Sea environment



Council of Immigrants & Council of Gender Equality

- Council of immigrants is the latest member in the family
- In Turku 9% of the poulation speaks other than Finnish or Swedish as the mother tongue and there is more than 100 different nationalities in Turku
- The main task is to provide a discussion table between the immigrant groups and the officials in order to support integration



All Influence groups promote equity and equal opportunities, therefore it has been discussed if there is a need for a separate Gender Equality group



Council of Elderly & Council of Disabled

- Both are statutory by law different focus groups
- Members represent strongly the NGO's of elderly/pensioners and disabled
- Nominated political representatives are also members
- Accessibility ombudsman a permanent member
- Organise events and hearings on topical issues
- Strong will to participate more in the planning phase of the topics
- New national Accessibility Act requires to take accessibility in consideration in a wide sense (clear language, font size, most of information is on the internet etc.)

Achievements

- The Influence Groups have increasingly worked together during the last two years.
- They see as their common task to promote health and well-being of Turku citizens.
- The co-operation takes the forms of common planning meetings and events, which offer platforms to share good experiences.
- The new co-operative models are also tools in tackling the inequalities.
- They have participated actively eg. in developing the Health and Wellbeing plan
 of Children and Youth and the Accessibility Plan of the city.



Conclusion

- Promoting participation and empowerment of people in planning and decision making is many times more a question of will than skills.
- The city officials need tools, encouragement, training and motivation to take people as part of the planning and decision-making.
- All activities require co-operation between the departments of the city, NGO's and residents.
- The questions to be considered in the future are is the family of the Influential Groups in Turku as versatile as possible? Do we need new groups?


