Project EU_SHAFE started in 2019, with the goal to improve policies and practices in 7 European regions by developing a comprehensive approach to Smart Healthy Age-Friendly Environments (SHAFE).

Therefore, policy alignment, collaborative efforts and sharing of good practices are the keystones to add better quality of life, more inclusive and sustainable health and social care systems and citizen's access to the services.

Through a 'learning by sharing' methodology, the consortium built a four-helix European community to exchange experiences and practices to improve multilevel policy instruments for the growth of community-based services and "ageing at home" around Europe.

After online and physical exchange and learning, we are ready to share our regional Action Plans. Each region has a different plan, unique to their regional context and needs.

This Action Plan covers the Municipality of Aarhus, Denmark. It has been prepared in collaboration between the EU_SHAFE partner Municipality of Aarhus, in close cooperation with regional stakeholders and with the Managing Authorities of the selected Policy Instruments.

Details of the Action Envisaged

1. Need addressed

The desire to extend the fields of use for assisted living technology has successfully driven The Welfare Technology Development Fund since 2013. In 2020 the Aarhus City Council decided to put emphasis on innovation and public private partnerships, and of January 2021 the Fund's name and objective has been adjusted accordingly.

Innovative public-private partnerships make it possible to document whether a new solution is technically possible and / or economically advantageous. Aarhus Municipality believes that cooperation with the private sector when testing and developing new technologies and digital services will lead to new solutions.

The shift in the Fund's objective calls for an adjustment of its guidelines, application- and impact measurement criteria so these reflect the emphasized focus on innovation and public-private partnerships. When innovation is the focal point in a project old methods of measuring effects are no longer sufficient. It is difficult to predict the outcome of an innovation process and even more difficult to predict an efficiency improvement. Therefore, we need new methods for measuring value and impact.

2. Overview of the Policy Improvement that this Action refers to





The policy to be addressed in this Action Plan is the PPI Fund for Assisted Living Technology (PPI Fund). The aim of the PPI Fund is to increase the use of technological solutions across the municipal organizations for the benefit of both citizens and companies. With 4 million Danish Kroner available annually, the Fund can support projects with funding, financial advice and project management. Through the years it has financed or co-financed many successful projects by testing and developing innovative digital solutions.

The Fund is financed by Aarhus municipality and is managed by a secretariat and a steering committee which represent all 6 magistrates departments in the municipality. The project manager of EU SHAFE in Aarhus has recently taken over the role as coordinator of the PPI Fund's secretariat and is therefore directly involved in the decision making process regarding the Action plan.

3. The background

It has been decided that the Aarhus municipality's action plan will focus on the Fund's structural change from an operational perspective to a business development perspective and to change the management of the policy instrument (improved governance) by amending the Fund's guidelines, application- and impact measurement criteria.

The development of Smart Healthy Age-Friendly Environments has a triple perspective:

- Economic perspective: Promoting business opportunities through new products and services for independent living, where technology should have a significant impact on meeting accessibility requirements and functional impairment.
- Social perspective: Increasing the quality of life of the ageing population requires the adaptation of systems, products and that create the right conditions to foster Ageing in Place and Silver Economy opportunities.
- Public perspective: Ensuring the sustainability of the welfare system in this context requires
 the efficient delivery of public services in the social and health sector, where technology
 can play an important role, and there, it is relevant of promoting age-friendly environments
 that encourage well-being and ageing in place solutions.

The objectives of Aarhus' policy instrument - the PPI Fund for Assisted Living Technology - are in line with the EU SHAFE perspectives, which have inspired the Fund, especially in terms of the economic perspective.

In 2020 the Aarhus City Council decided to promote more public private partnerships, and by January 2021 the Fund adjusted its name and objective accordingly. Going forward the Fund primarily supports public private innovation projects but can also provide support for internal activities in Aarhus Municipality for the development of ideas prior to collaborations with companies.

The Fund's objective continues to focus on supporting the establishment and implementation of assisted living technology projects, and thereby pave the way for increased utilization of technologies in Aarhus, but with the added aim of supporting business development through PPI.





In addition to the shift in the PPI Fund's objective and its renewed focus on public private innovation the Fund has decided to turn up its focus on value creation and the measuring of qualitative effects in addition to the quantitative effects.

We wanted to learn from the partners' experiences regarding value creation and measuring of impact. Consequently, we arranged a workshop on impact as a part of the programme for the 3rd Interregional Policy Learning Meeting in Aarhus in September 2021. Impact measurement can help create systemic, sustainable change and value creation in an organisation, and this is why we found it very important to work on.

At the workshop the partners discussed the expected results and impact of our action plans and how to measure this impact. The partners briefly presented their policy instruments and the status of the action plans under development. Divided into working groups, the partners discussed the challenges they faced improving their policy instruments, what impact they were aiming at achieving, how to measure this impact and presented the planned next steps. All project's partners agreed that discussion and exchange of experiences had within the working groups was very valuable for the preparation of the action plans. Following the meeting in Aarhus, we decided on including the Fund's steps towards value creation and impact measurement in our Action Plan.
